

Thomas König's book *Die Frühgeschichte des Fulbright Program in Österreich: Transatlantische „Fühlungnahme auf dem Gebiete der Erziehung“* (Studienverlag, 2012) is based on extensive research in the archives of the Austrian-American Educational Commission and investigates the impact of the Fulbright Program in Austria from its inception in 1950 until the mid-1960. It describes how the program was initially financed and managed, analyzes the role social sciences and American studies were cast to play in U.S. cultural policy, and profiles the first generation of American Fulbright scholars who taught in Austria. König's book illustrates how the Fulbright Program proved to be a source of considerable innovation (and occasional controversy) for Austrian institutions of higher education and describes the transatlantic "contacts in the field of education" as a conflict-ridden success story.

Under the auspices of the celebration of the sixtieth anniversary of the establishment of the Fulbright Program in Austria in November 2010, the Austrian-American Educational Commission held an international conference about the history of academic exchange and its ongoing relevance at the Amerika Haus. A special volume of the leading Austrian journal for contemporary history *zeitgeschichte* with the title "Impacts and Images: The Challenges and Limitations of U.S. Cultural Diplomacy in Postwar Austria and Germany" has appeared recently (2012/1) and contains articles by conference participants (Christian H. Stifter, George Blaustein, Christina Schwartz, Reinhild Kreis and Helga Embacher) that address the history and dynamics of U.S. cultural and exchange policies in Austria and Germany in the immediate postwar period.
