SOLDIERS AND SURGEONS: WOUNDS OF WAR AND THEIR TREATMENT FROM PREHISTORY TO THE CRUSADES

17-19 SEPTEMBER 2015

CARNUNTUM ARCHAEOLOGICAL PARK
PETRONELL-CARNUNTUM, AUSTRIA

This symposium will bring together scholars of different disciplines and specialisations who are interested in military medicine and the treatment of wounds in all their aspects, from prehistory to the Crusades. The symposium is the biennial academic meeting of the Carnuntum Archaeological Park and they will be responsible for publication in their prestigious series of volumes.

It is proposed that the symposium examines the subject within a number of broad themes including archaeology, literacy, papyrological and epigraphical evidence, osteology, palaeopathology and architecture. Discussion will be led by invited keynote speakers.

LOCATION

The symposium will be held within the site of the important Roman garrison and town of Carnuntum in Eastern Austria, now an archaeological park. The social programme will include a tour of Carnuntum and its archaeological park and museum and a visit to a local winery. There will also be opportunities to visit nearby Vienna and Bratislava. Details of accommodation costs, registration fees and domestic arrangements will be available by the end of December 2014 for those who have provisionally registered.

PAPERS, POSTERS AND WORKSHOPS

Thirty minutes will be allocated to each paper. The languages of the symposium will be English and German. There will be unlimited space for posters (size 120 x 90 cm) on any topic related to the themes. Posters will be formally presented at a time reserved for this during the symposium. We also invite proposals by those wishing to organise specialist workshops within any theme of the symposium.
