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This summer school program aims to introduce master and doctoral students of the classics, Byzantine studies, and medieval history to the phenomenon of crises in the pre-modern Greek world. The chronological spectrum ranges from the agrarian and debt crisis in archaic Athens (6 c. BCE) to the Order of St. John on Rhodes (15 c. CE). These long periods will be examined using several case studies.

One focus of the program is the Hellenistic age. The kingdoms of this epoch were too weak and politically unstable to ensure long-term peace, functioning infrastructure, or sustainable administration. Roman influence and the conquest of the East led to greater stability, but also to revolts and uprisings. This was especially true in Egypt due to its complex religious and ethnic diversity. On the other hand, Roman rule also provided an opportunity for individual social advancement, as exemplified by Asia Minor. The crises in late Antiquity during Justinian's reign were carried over to Rhodes in late medieval times. The excellent archaeological remnants of the sanctuary of Olympia make it possible to study particular conflicts as they unfolded in one place over several centuries.

Our summer school program provides a broad view of crisis at different times and places in the pre-modern Greek-speaking world. Crises and the reasons and occasions for them, their manifestation and development, and their short and long-term consequences were highly diverse. So, too, were the efforts to resolve them, which were characterized by varying levels of success.
